Delegates at the 2010 Kiwanis International Convention passed an amendment to the Kiwanis International Bylaws which require criminal history background checks for all incumbents and candidates for International Office and offices in direct line of succession to District Governor in order to assure the highest standards of leadership in Kiwanis.

Kiwanis International has provided criminal history background forms for the Jim Mann, the 2009-2010 Kentucky-Tennessee Governor-Elect and Don Ritter, the only announced candidate for the 2010-2011 Kentucky-Tennessee Governor-Elect to complete. Both have indicated that they have completed and returned these forms to Kiwanis International.

Glen Kleine, Governor of the KT District said, "Since the effective date of having completed the criminal history background check is October 1, 2010, it is recommended that any candidate that plans to have their name placed in nomination for the 2010-11 Kentucky-Tennessee Governor-Elect complete the criminal history background check process prior to their nomination at the 2010 K-T Clarksville Convention House of Delegates."

Clubs Who have Gained Five New Kiwanis Family Members Should Request Banner Patch

K-T First Lady Joan Kleine encourages clubs that have five new family members to contact her so they will receive their Family Membership Patch at the upcoming Clarksville Convention.

Any immediate family member, in any related Kiwanis membership organization, and in any location, will count toward the banner batch.

Examples: A spouse of one of your current members who joins your club will qualify as one new member. A mother of one of your current members who joins another club in the K-T district qualifies as a second new member. A daughter of one of your current members who attends college in another state and joins a Circle K Club will qualify as your third new member. A grandson of one of your current members who joins a Key Club will qualify as your fourth new member. And a granddaughter of one of your current members who joins a Builder's Club will qualify as your fifth new member.

If you do not get her on the phone simply leave the message that the XYZ Club is eligible for a Family Membership Patch and that you will have a representative at the Clarksville Convention to receive it.

For the love of Scouting

OAK RIDGE, Tenn. — An exhibit that is all about "boys" will close Sunday at the American Museum of Science and Energy, and go back into storage.

The exhibit is the private Boy Scout collection of Oak Ridge resident Lloyd Stokes, and is being exhibited in conjunction with the 100th anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America.

"100 Years of Scouting: Celebrating the Adventure, Continuing the Journey," is Stokes' collection of scouting memorabilia, as well as donated artifacts from scouting enthusiasts locally and across the country.

In addition to the commemoration of 100 years of scouting, the exhibit is also a celebration of the 65th anniversary of Oak Ridge Boy Scout Troop 129. Stokes has been associated with scouting since 1948, 43 years of those years with Troop 129.

"I've been with the scouts for 43 years, 33 as an assistant master," Stokes said. "The Kiwanis Club has been the troop's sponsor for 61 years."

Stokes said Troop 129 is the only Boy Scout troop that has been continually serving Oak Ridge since 1945, when scouting started in the Secret City. Steve Bellofatto is the scout master and Harold Hartman is the Kiwanis sponsor committee chairman. During the 65 years of service, the Troop has had 104 Eagles.

But Stokes, as a boy, from 1948 to 1951, was a member of Troop 325. He also attained the rank of Eagle. In those days, the Troop met at the old VFW building on Jefferson Circle, on the second floor.

And, the AMSE exhibit tells all about it.

"We're winding down," Stokes said of the exhibit, adding that it has been very well received. The exhibit opened in January.

At the AMSE entrance, visitors are generally met by Albert Einstein, who stands guard in his suit and bow tie. Since January, the old physicist has donned a Boy Scout uniform. From there, visitors can see Lloyd's life-long love of scouting through videos, memorabilia and artifacts.

"That flag is from the National Jamboree in Valley Forge, Pa., in 1950," Stokes said Wednesday. The photos on display are from that Jamboree. Stokes is trying to identify some of the scouts. He knows some of the boys because they are from his neighborhood troop, but others he can't identify.

"I didn't get to go to the Jamboree," Stokes said, adding this his family didn't have the money.

Other memorabilia includes donated items depicting Bill Wilcox's service at the New York World's Fair in 1939. Wilcox is considered the Oak Ridge city historian.

A 48-star American flag is also on display. Stokes said the flag is on loan from Cindy Whorley, who is Troop 129's assistant scoutmaster. With the flag is an Ed Westcott photo of Scouts Henry King, Bill Trimby and Bob Linsay taken in 1946.

Visitors can also see a camp, set up with a World War II surplus tent, which scouts in the '40s used often at Camp Kromer.

Camp Kromer, named for Col. Phillip Kromer, was located in the '40s and '50s where today stands the Central Services Center. Kromer later became mayor of Oak Ridge.

Stokes has been collecting his treasures for many years. Some of his books have publishing dates as far back as 1929. There are history posters, and fact sheets, as well as the many patches, flags, canteens, compasses, wood-carved soap box derby cars, mess kits and uniforms.

"It's been a lot of fun," Stokes said, adding he wasn't alone in his efforts. He said many people, friends and acquaintances helped with donations and setting up the exhibit. He attributes the hard work to his wife, Betty.

"I couldn't do it without her," he said.

In addition, they turned out at Ronald McDonald House clean-ups and worked the UT game day parking lot which benefits RMH. They also took on leadership roles in the

Key Club and motivated their peers to support service and club activities.

In accepting their awards, all the students expressed a deep humility at having been selected and vowed to continue their service into adulthood. Former Key Club Advisor and West Knoxville Kiwanian, Ernie Roberts, commented that it is this humility which distinguishes a servant leader. He addressed the students saying "It's not the sign you wear or the boasts you make that reward you in life; rather it is the things you do that make the person, and we are proud to recognize that tonight."

Playground donation

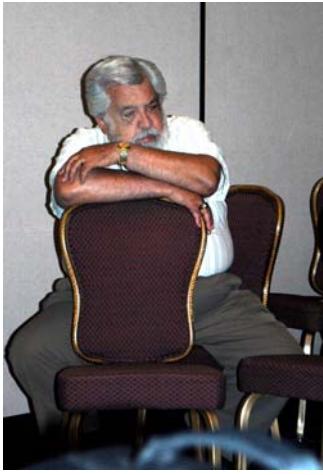


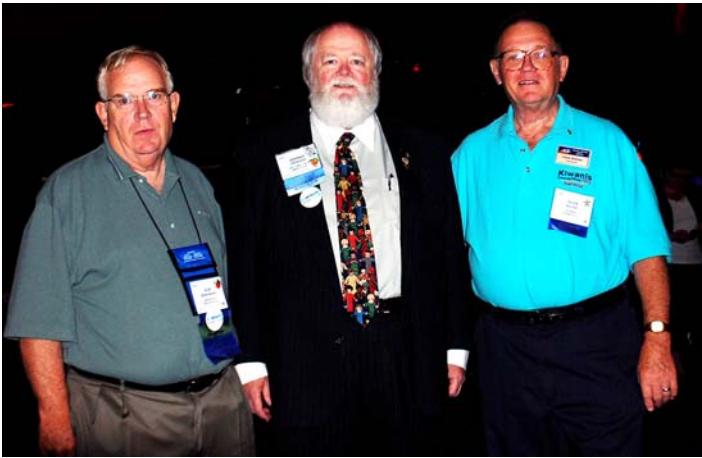
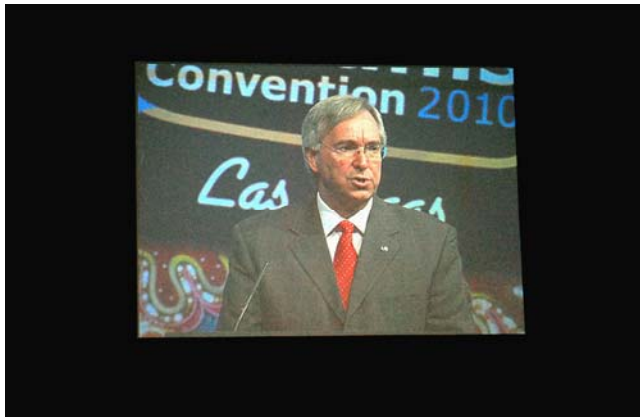

Key Club International President Abigail McKamey, the immediate past Governor of the Kentucky Tennessee Key Club District, and Director Mike Downs presented the Edison Collegiate High School its charter and installed members on Wednesday, May 19 at a ceremony held in the Edison State College Charlotte Campus auditorium.

With the chartering of the ECHS Key Club, Key Club International surpassed 250,000 members.

Edison Collegiate High School (ECHS) is Southwest Florida's first collegiate high school and Charlotte County's only charter school. Located on the Charlotte campus of Edison State College, students of ECHS will enjoy a collegiate environment and graduate with both a diploma and associates degree.

"Our students have been very passionate in regards to community involvement and they understand what a tremendous organization Key Club is," ECHS Principal Diane Juneau said. "To have our own charter means a lot to our students and faculty alike. The fact President McKamey was on campus for the occasion is an incredible honor and something everyone involved will cherish for a long time."

Key Club International is the oldest and largest service program for high schools students in the world. An affiliate of Kiwanis International, Key Club is a student-led organization that teaches leadership through serving others as members build themselves as they build their schools and communities.

"We are happy these young men and women have a passion to share their time, talent and treasure with others."

The ECHS Charter opened with 18 members and an environmental focus under the guidance of teacher Michael E. Mitchell. Marissa Butcosk will serve as president; Taylor Richards as vice president; Carissa Stepp as secretary; Gabriella Austin as treasurer; and Holly Osborne as editor.

The ECHS charter is sponsored the Port Charlotte Sunrise Kiwanis and President Tom Natoli, who also will be on hand for Wednesday's ceremony. Sunrise member Connie Thrasher Key as the ECHS advisor.

"The students of Edison Collegiate High School have been tremendous from the start; their energy and commitment are inspiring to everyone at Edison State College,"

Charlotte Campus President Dr. Patricia Land said. "I think the addition of Key Club is a perfect fit and will allow the ECHS student to continue developing as leaders and role models for the future."

2010 Kentucky-Tennessee District Workshops at Convention

From time to time fellow Kiwanians ask me, "Why should I or my club attend the convention?" I have attended many conventions, both business related and Kiwanis. The reasons to attend are similar: 1) Education, 2) Fellowship, and 3) Organizational Business. I have found that I return home after attending a Kiwanis convention with new ideas for my club, new friendships made and friendships renewed. I have always felt that I have brought back more value to my club and myself personally than the cost of attending the meetings.

This year, we are working to have a value packed convention. On the education/workshop side I know it will be. What are some of our workshops?

- Meeting the Challenges of a small Kiwanis Club: We have many clubs in our District with fewer than twenty members. Earl Forbes, with Kiwanis International, will lead a two part workshop (Sessions I and II), examining the unique challenges facing the small club as it strives to meet the needs of children in its community. If you are a club officer in a club with 20 or fewer members, I urge you attend these sessions.
- Growing Kiwanis within the K-T District: Past International President, Don Canady, will lead a two session workshop examining how we can grow our service to children of Kentucky and Tennessee by increasing the number of clubs in our District. Don will stay on the next week helping us build a new club in our District. Lieutenant Governors and their Division Growth Chairs should plan on attending Don's workshops.
- Kiwanis 101: Jan Larson, our District Chair for Club Leadership Education, will lead this workshop. This workshop is designed to be an introduction to Kiwanis and Kiwanis leadership. Ideal for new members and new or aspiring club leaders, or anyone who wants to know more about the "new" Kiwanis. Lots of time for Q&A, so come prepared with your questions!
- The Internet and More for Club Secretaries: Bill Larson, a ten-year club secretary and district trainer, will be leading this session. We are fortunate that our meeting site has internet capability and Bill will go on-line to explore available club secretary tools. Additional hints and suggestions will also be covered. Attendance at this session will qualify any repeat club secretary for meeting their required training.

Other workshops will include:

The Kiwanis Family includes great service programs for youth. If there is any school in your community from elementary, middle, high school or college that does not have a Kiwanis Youth program in the school, please consider starting one or more such programs this year. We will have workshop featuring our Kiwanis Family. Consider having one or more members from your club attend one of these workshops.

- Great Community Service Projects: Many of our fellow Kiwanis Clubs in our District sponsor additional great service programs for their communities. Come and hear what other clubs are doing in their communities.
- Economic Growth Starts with Young Children: Speakers include Robert Krupicka, Project Manager, Partnership for America's Economic Success and Ben Cundiff, owner of Cundiff Farms
- Working with Hearing Impaired Children, to be presented by Debbie Brilling, Chair of the Kiwanis Georgia District Buccaneer Program.

Southwest district request

Prior to the Southwest District Convention on August 6th, 7th and 8th - we will be completing a District Project which will benefit the families of the children who fly in from all over the world to be treated at the Phoenix Children's Hospital and the Burro's Neurological Institute. The project is in partnership with the Ronald McDonald House in Phoenix, Arizona. Kiwanis will be sponsoring a Family Room at the Ronald McDonald House and will be renovating the room - beginning the last week in July 2010. This includes painting - including a Mural on the wall depicting the Children of the World, putting in ceramic tile on the floor including a tile which will have the Kiwanis International Logo in it, purchasing new furniture and television.

Our goal is to decorate this room with the Kiwanis International theme. My thought was - would it not be great if we had access to items (for children or about children) from all over the Kiwanis International World. My hope is we will have more items than we can display at one time - which would force us to change the decor of the room every four months. That way when a family is re-visiting the Children's Hospital and they are staying in the Kiwanis Room - it will have changed from their last visit.

I do have a deadline for a few items to be received by August 1st, 2010. However, we do not need you'all to respond right now - since you may have an idea that the children in your area could help with - and they may not be available to complete the project at this time.
